Course Description/Objectives:

This course is designed for students who have taken Sculpture and Ceramics II and are interested in refining and strengthening their sculpture and ceramics skills. Students will develop sculpture and ceramics projects using advanced techniques and more experimental approaches. The basic sculpture and ceramics techniques will be reinforced as well as developing more advanced throwing and hand building methods. The student will develop and present a portfolio of advanced sculpture and ceramics projects. Students are expected to work on assignments outside of class, keep a sketchbook, research ideas and discuss their work, ideas, and inspiration as well as the work of other students and master artists.
