Carlisle's rich history provides the perfect backdrop for engaging tours like our most popular—Homicidal History and History or Hoax tour both of which focus on 270 years of incredible, sometimes bloody, often mysterious, and always interesting cast of characters that have Carlisle home. If you step into the parlor area of our shoppe you'll surely notice the original 1800's camera that Chris uses, along with an original 1863 chemical recipe, to produce tintype portraits. We even have a full wardrobe of historical costuming so you can even dress the part! Courtney, who specializes in fashion history and historical garment construction, makes all the clothing—and spends most of her time working on custom garments for reenactors, educators, and the general public.
