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Department Teacher Spotlight:

9th Grade U.S. History Classes

Recently, 9th-grade U.S. history students had the opportunity to learn more about World War I through artifacts. Retired Colonel Frank Hancock, who represents Time Travelers Trunks, shared a presentation on the first modern war. He discussed the causes of the war and the devastating effects that the First World War had on soldiers and civilians. Students had the opportunity to participate in group activities and engage with artifacts such as uniforms, weaponry, and other pieces from the battlefield and the home font. This allowed students to become more acutely aware of just how different this war was compared to any war prior. They learned of the impact that those differences had on the sheer number of casualties and severity of injuries, both mental and physical.






MT. TABOR AME Zion Church
